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

Session Highlights

For the past few months our session meetings have looked a little different. We haven't gone through each committee checking in or reading the reports that have been submitted. We've been studying the Bible together and seeing where the Spirit is leading CNC. Our meeting on January 18, 2009 was full of the Spirit. After some action items including allowing GALEO to use our building again for their Saturday classes, ordering communion to be served during Scott Pieper and Ashley DeVore's wedding, and hearing about the Seventh Day Adventists no longer using our building for their worship needs, we moved into a Bible study led by Tom Tewell on Luke 5:1-11.

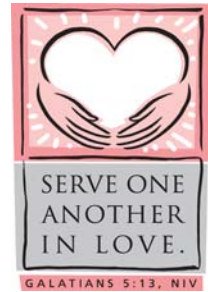
This text is the story of Jesus telling the exhausted and tired fisherman to go into deeper water to catch some fish after a night of catching nothing. With a little reluctance, the fisherman go and their nets are overflowing with fish. At the end of the passage Jesus tells these men that they will become fishers of people. As a group we discussed how CNC can relate to this passage. We also shared where each of us had experienced God in the last few weeks. Some of the stories included conversations with fellow employees, friends, and encounters with the homeless, fisherman, children, colleagues, grandchildren and visitors.

After an hour or so, the elephant in the room was vocalized, that with the SDA church leaving, we will be over \$30,000 short from making budget this year. Rick gave us the three options he believes CNC can do. We can either see this short fall an opportunity to do something radically different with CNC, we can become a New Church Development or we can plan on closing our doors on December 31, 2009. As a session we committed to throwing our net into deeper water; becoming a vital congregation and we will have results from this endeavor by June 30, 2009. The session will be going on a retreat with Tom Tewell on February 28, 2009 to further flesh out this net throwing business. Please, please, please talk to a session member if you have some wonderful ideas on how we can become a vital congregation to our neighborhood or if you have any concerns.

Following our wholehearted commitment to becoming a vital congregation, we had a few more action items to get to. We voted down endorsing the "Declaration of Principles for a Presidential Executive Order on Prisoner Treatment, Torture and Cruelty". We voted for an aerobics class to use the fellowship hall two mornings a week if they decide to choose us as their site. The session retreat with the new elders will be on May 15 and 16, with the ordination if applicable and instillation on May 17th. Scott Pieper and Gretchen Turner were appointed as the session members to be on next year's Nominating Committee.

Session members are to read John 5:1-18 over the next month and see what it is saying to CNC. Join us in this studying let us know what you are hearing the Spirit say about CNC. In addition to our voices, we need to hear your voice as well.

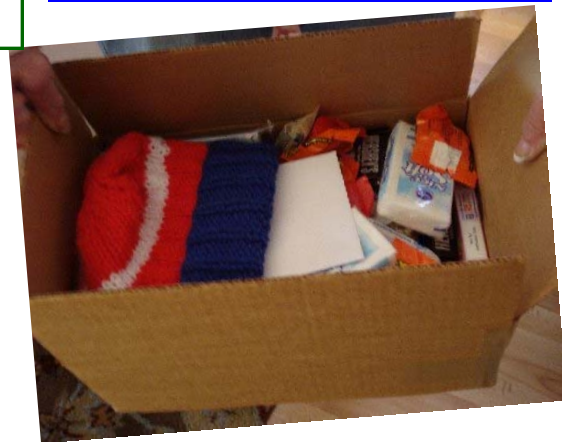

Our most recent **6 STAR** Afghanistan family arrived in November from India where they lived as refugees for seventeen years. The nine family members are now living in the upstairs apartment behind Druid Hills Baptist Church.



This family is a study in contrasts. **Abbas** is a handsome 22-year-old guy who received his Bachelor of Commerce degree, speaks English fluently, worked in finance in India and serves as the family spokesman. But his two older sisters, **Rahnuma and Nasrin** (26 and 25) have never attended school and cannot read and write.

The youngest sister, **Parveen** (age 12) is in the 7 grade at Inman, and her brother **Salman** (age 16) attends Grady High School. **Farshi** (20) attended school in India, speaks English well, and hopes to earn a GED here. There is also **Azim**, age 20, who completed one year of college in India and was working at the YMCA as an interpreter. The oldest son is living "without papers" in London. Now that the Safi's are in the U.S., their primary concern is to help get their son safely here. **Khairhullah** (father) and **Khushnama** (mother) are both 47 years old and need to learn English.

They are members of the Pashtun tribe which uses the last name of **Khan** and speaks Pashto, instead of Farsi. Pashto uses the Arabic alphabet with additional Pashto letters.

The family is Sunni Muslim and follows a Halal diet which is the Muslim equivalent of Kosher. All animals must be treated humanely and blessed following a prescribed ritual before being killed for food. Pork, alcohol, and tobacco are prohibited.

So how did an Afghani family end up in India and then come to Georgia? They were living in a fertile part of Northern Afghanistan in the Kapisa Province with their extended family. Although they lived in the town of Tagaf, they kept their own cow and buffalo for milk and yogurt. Food was raised on the farm for export to India. The family also had a butcher shop where **Khairhullah** worked with his father and brothers. The extended family (including the grandparents, five uncles and their families) and the **Khairhullah Safi** family lived together in a large house.

During the war with Russia in the 1980's, there was pressure for the adult males to join the fight. Men from competing political factions came to **Khairhullah's** house several times to recruit him, but he was able to get away. At night all of the men slept on the roof of the house to watch for danger. One night, a rocket fell right beside **Khairhullah**, but it didn't explode. He decided that night to leave Afghanistan. After a few weeks in Pakistan, he moved on to India where he had once visited with his father. Two years later, **Khairhullah** returned to get his wife, children, and parents to live with him in Delhi. Their house in Tagaf was half destroyed in the war and the farm no longer exists. His five brothers and their families moved to Peshawar, Pakistan where they still live.

In India **Khairhullah** began a new life as an entrepreneur who received commissions helping Afghani people who brought their food and supplies to sell in India. Later he also resumed working at a butcher shop. His wife (**Khushnama**) and daughters (**Rahnuma** and **Nasrin**) contributed to the family income as accomplished seamstresses including embroidery. Cricket, carrom, chess, and other board games were the children's favorite entertainment. Life was difficult in India as the family was classified as refugees and was not allowed to progress to citizenship, to attend government schools or have visas.

The family is very appreciative of the generosity of the members of **Six-Star churches**. They have received donated furniture, supplies, clothes, and transportation for medical and social service appointments. **Azim** has even received medical care at the Atlanta Medical Center for kidney stones. The children have their school supplies and are enrolled in school thanks to your donations. What is needed now? How can you help?

Abbas is looking for a job, hopefully in finance where he previously worked, and **Azim** (who is fluent in English) is also seeking a job. The parents and two oldest girls need tutors to learn basic English before they will be able to work. They would also like to resume work as seamstresses, but first they will need a sewing machine. Adult bicycles would help the family become more independent in the community. **If you can help with any of these needs or are willing to socialize and introduce them to some of Atlanta's attractions, please call Marc Dryman at 770-458-0855.** Please keep this family in mind over the next few months as you hear about resources that could help them adjust to their new country.
